ABOUT THE BAPTISM OF SAINT JOHN

Saint John the Baptist plays one of the most important roles in the history of salvation. He was a man of great fame for his asceticism, spiritual purity, and preaching, and this is witnessed to by the fact that "Jerusalem and all Judea went out to him, and all the region round about Jordan". But he is known primarily for his role as Forerunner and Baptist of the Lord.

As Forerunner, he:

- comes in the spirit of Elias (see below)
- preaches repentance for the coming Messiah
- calls for the bearing of fruit, warning that those who do not bear fruit will be "cut down and cast into the fire"
- fulfills the prophecy of Isaiah by serving as "the voice of one crying in the wilderness, prepare the way of the Lord, make His paths straight" (Is. 40:3)
- fulfills the prophecy of Malachi, "Behold, I send My messenger (angel) before Thy face, who shall prepare Thy way before Thee" (Mal. 3:1)

As Baptist, he:

- baptizes for the remission of sins (literally "to let go" of sins – Mark 1:4)
- points to one greater than he, Who will baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire
- after first hesitating, he baptizes the Lord, in order to "full all righteousness"

The ax is laid to the root of the trees: The axe means the judgment of Christ, and the trees stand for each one of us.

When asked who he was, St. John very clearly explained that he was not the Christ, but that that One was coming, "whose sandal strap he was not worthy



to stoop down and loose" for the Christ would baptize not with water, but with the Holy Spirit and with fire.

DID YOU KNOW?

Q. Why did Christ say that St. John the Baptist came in the spirit of Elias?

A. The Prophet Elias, who ascended into heaven on a fiery chariot, was believed to come back to earth just before the coming of the Messiah. In Matthew 11:14, the Lord says that St. John is this Elias who was to come. Even in appearance St. John looked like Elias, as "John had his clothing of camel's hair and a leather girdle about his loins" (Matthew 3:4) and Elias "was a hairy man who wore a leathern belt around his loins." (2 Kings 1:8).

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Last Came the King

When God created the heavens and the earth, there still had not appeared in the visible world that great and important creature, the human being. It was not to be expected that the monarch should make an appearance in advance of his subjects. On the contrary, only when the kingdom had first been made ready was the king to appear who was to reign over it. So there arose first the continents, the islands, the sea, and spread like a roof over them, the vault of heaven.

Riches from every quarter were gathered into the royal palace. By riches I mean all created things, the trees, the plants, everything that has sight and breath and life. I should include in their number, also, the materials which have been counted valuable in people's eyes because of their beauty, namely gold, silver and the precious stones which people love. The abundance of all these God hid like royal treasure in the bowels of the earth.

Only after that did God make human beings appear on earth. He intended them to be able to admire the beauty of the creation and to be lords over it. They were to be able, through their enjoyment of created things, to comprehend the wisdom of their provider. By the size and the beauty of them, they were to fathom the greatness of their Creator, which is beyond description or understanding. That is why humankind was introduced last, after the rest of creation, not as some unimportant afterthought, but as a suitable sovereign over all that God had made.
