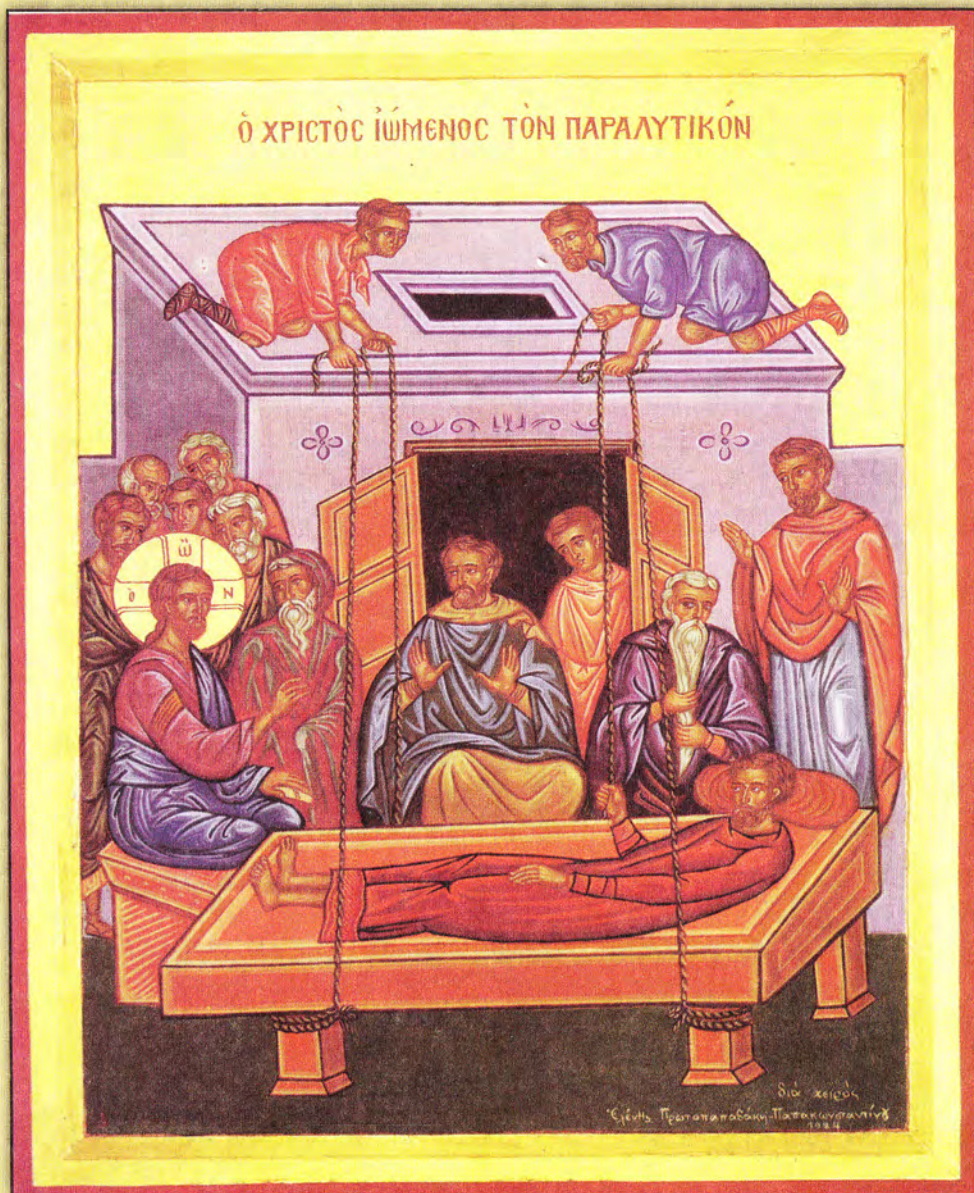

COMMEMORATION OF ST. GREGORY PALAMAS

Bishop Basil Losten, *Our Paschal Pilgrimage*

The second Sunday of Lent is kept as a feast of St. Gregory Palamas, the Archbishop of Thessalonika in the fourteenth century. Like the restoration of the Holy Icons, this memorial of St. Gregory has to do with historical events, but also relates to our understanding of the Christian vocation, and the possibility of every Christian to achieve genuine holiness. St. Gregory taught that all Christians are called to union with God, which is the object of the Christian life.

St. Gregory was a great ascetic, and a great master of the monastic life, but he teaches that this invitation to union with God is open to every Christian. This is the challenge of Lent, but that challenge faces us all year round. Likewise this is a challenge of monasticism but not just for the monks and nuns. The Holy Father has expressed it very well: "...in the East, monasticism was not seen merely as a separate condition, proper



to a precise category of Christians, but rather a reference point for all the baptized, according to the gifts offered to each by the Lord; it was presented as a symbolic synthesis of Christianity."

St. Gregory Palamas himself has enjoyed an increasing popularity in the past fifty years or so. His spiritual theology is not absolutely binding, but he is an important and influential figure in patristic spirituality. At one time, St. Gregory's ideas were highly controversial, and his memorial was removed from our liturgical books after the Synod of Zamost'. But with the recent profound studies of St. Gregory, and the deeper appreciation of the Christian East, the Holy See has restored St. Gregory's memorial on the Second Sunday of Great Lent...Our own Patriarch Joseph Slipyj made a strong and positive contribution to this restoration of St. Gregory Palamas to Catholic liturgical practice....

ON THE MYSTERY OF CONFESSION

By Saint John of Kronstadt

The person who is accustomed to give account of his life at Confession will not fear to give an answer at the terrible Judgment Seat of Christ. For this purpose was the mild tribunal of penitence instituted, that we may give an answer without shame, having been cleansed and healed through repentance here below.

The more sincerely we confess our sins, the more calm will the soul be afterwards. For sins are secret serpents, gnawing at the heart of a man, and never letting him rest; they are prickly thorns, constantly piercing the soul, they are spiritual darkness.

Bear the sufferings of the operation so that you may be restored to health—I speak of Confession. I mean that at Confession, you must declare all your shameful deeds to your confessor, without concealment, though it may well be painful, shameful, ignominious, and humiliating. Otherwise, the wound will remain unhealed, will continue to pain you, will undermine your spiritual health, and will become a cause for other spiritual weaknesses, or sinful habits or vices.

As soon as you have told the Lord your sins, with a contrite heart, they melt away; as soon as you have sighed and sorrowed for them, they are no more.

Confession can be heard following any service or by appointment. Please speak with Fr. James if you have any questions or if you would like to schedule an appointment.

THE FELLOWSHIP OF THE UNASHAMED

I won't give up, shut up, let up, or slow up until I have stayed up, stored up, prayed up, paid up, and spoken up for the cause of Christ. I am a disciple of Jesus Christ, I am a Catholic. I must go until He comes again, give until I drop, speak out until all know, and work until He stops me.

And when He returns for His own, He will have no difficulty in recognizing me. My banner is clear for I am a part of the Fellowship of the Unashamed. "I am not ashamed of the Gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes..." (Romans 1:16)

THE SACRAMENT OF CONFESSION

is one of reconciliation with God, bringing about not only a clearing of the conscience through the remission of sins, but also a healing of the soul through our recommitment to Christ. This Sacrament should therefore be received frequently by all Catholic Christians but especially during each of the fasting seasons, including the Great Fast. For those who wish to receive Holy Communion, the Sacrament of Confession is indispensable and absolutely necessary to maintaining our spiritual health and well being. Fr. ON KEEPING A SPIRITUAL FAST

There is both a physical and a spiritual fast. In the physical fast the body abstains from food and drink. In the spiritual fast, the faster abstains from evil intentions, words and deeds. One who truly fasts abstains from anger, rage, malice, and vengeance. One who truly fasts abstains from idle and foul talk, empty rhetoric, slander, condemnation, flattery, lying and all manner of spiteful talk. In a word, a real faster is one who withdraws from all evil.

"THE COMMANDMENTS ARE NOT IMPOSITIONS FROM SOME DESPOT, BUT RATHER THE THERAPEUTIC CURE FOR A COMPLETE RECOVERY FROM THE CORRUPTION OF OUR NATURE. THE LORD DID NOT GIVE COMMANDMENTS FROM THE HEIGHT OF HIS DIVINE GREATNESS, BUT RATHER CAME DOWN AMONG US AND OBSERVED THESE COMMANDMENTS HIMSELF, FIRST, EXHORTING US TO IMITATE HIM AS HIS TRUE FRIENDS (SEE JOHN 15:14). THEREFORE, CHRISTIANITY IS NOT AN ABSTRACT IDEOLOGY, BUT A PRACTICAL AND CONCRETE CONFESSION. IN THE FACE OF EVERY SENSUAL ENTICEMENT OF SIN ENCOUNTERED BY MAN FROM THE SPIRIT OF THE WORLD, THE FLESH AND THE DEVIL, THE CHRISTIAN CONFESSES HIS FAITH IN CHRIST OUR GOD BY REJECTING THE SIN, AND THUS SHOWING HIS LOVE FOR GOD BY THE KEEPING OF HIS COMMANDMENT. 'HE WHO HAS MY COMMANDMENTS AND KEEPS THEM, HE IT IS WHO LOVES ME' (JOHN 14:21) CHRIST TAUGHT US TO FULFILL THE WILL OF THE HEAVENLY FATHER, JUST AS TO THE FATHER HE BECAME 'OBEDIENT UNTO DEATH, EVEN

UNTO DEATH ON A CROSS' (PHIL. 2:8). THE KEEPING OF THE COMMANDMENTS IS THE PRECISE MEANS OF COMMUNION BETWEEN THE PERSONAL GOD AND MAN.

TODAY'S MAN HAS BEEN BROUGHT UP ON MATERIALISTIC IDEOLOGIES AND HAS LITTLE OR NO IDEA OF THE INNER PEACE AND CALM BESTOWED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT UPON THOSE WHO LIVE IN HARMONY WITH HIS COMMANDMENTS. The Grace of Almsgiving

The kind and merciful Lord, dearly beloved, deigns to provide occasions and opportunities in many ways, whereby we can redeem our sins without great labor and difficulty. Since He sees people without the strength to fast for their sins or unable to abstain from meat or wine, the poverty of the poor gives the wealthy an opportunity to sell their earthly goods and distribute them to the poor. his secures abundant fruits, for by generously bestowing their superfluities upon poor men they obtain the remission of their sins.

What can be so good and delightful, so easy and ready at hand, dearly beloved, as to strive to redeem your sins by giving alms out of what God has deigned to give you more than you need? God does not command you to spend what is necessary for yourself or your family, for of this the Apostle says: I do not mean that the relief of others should become your burden (2 Corin-

thians 8:13). God does not need to spend your superfluities on Himself, but He wants to keep them for you in eternal bliss. Indeed, He wanted the poor to be so in order that the rich might have a means of redeeming their sins. God could have made all people rich, but He wanted to provide the rich with an opportunity for showing mercy.

Not for their own merit do the few rich gain more than they need and the many poor people not acquire even what they need. This is the cleverness of divine mercy, as I said before, so that while the poor patiently bear their poverty they may obtain forgiveness of their sins, and the rich, in turn, while they mercifully distribute their superfluities, they may redeem their offenses, and attain eternal rewards.
