

Don't refuse this invitation!

Most people like to go to banquets. They may not like the long speeches, but all like the fellowship, the friendliness, and the food. Today's Gospel talks about a man who made a great banquet and invited many people to come. But many refused the invitation and made excuses for not attending. Now who would refuse such an invitation? As a matter of fact, many of us have refused this invitation! Yes, we all have refused His invitation at some point in our lives. We who are Christians have all been invited by Almighty God Himself to His great banquets.

The banquet of God is one for our spirits, not just our bodies. Jesus once said, "A man cannot live on bread alone." He must also feed his spirit. This feasting is on the most pure and most precious Eucharist, Holy Communion. In this supper, we unite ourselves with Christ Himself; He comes down to dwell in us and share our life. At every Divine Liturgy, fifty-two Sundays of the year, the invitation is sounded by Christ through the Deacon: "With the fear of God, faith (and love) approach."

Another banquet that God has prepared is the most glorious and special of all. This is the eternal feast of Heaven, the feast of Eternal Light; this is the endless joy of Christ. You would think that no one would reject this invitation of God's eternal feast! There is room for all. He has not just asked, but pleaded for all to come. Christ is there, preparing a place for us even as we speak. There is a setting

with our nameplate on it, reserved just for us. Yet, believe it or not, some will refuse to come!

Dare we take lightly the invitation of God's feast? Dare we shut our ears when the call comes for Communion, received in a state of preparedness and discerning what one is doing according to St Paul's warning in 1 Corinthians 11:27-32? Dare we receive Communion and then bolt out of church like a bat out of ****, without any words or prayers of gratitude to Him or to His Body, the Church, afterwards? Dare we take His Body and Blood in Holy Communion and then ignore the Body and Blood of Christ which is the very people sitting next to us in the church pew? Dare we take, indeed self-righteously grasp at, the Body and Blood of Christ, which is Holy Communion, even saying "I deserve it because I have no sins", and then separate the Body and Blood of Christ from the Mind of Christ, by believing or teaching others to believe - by our words or example - those very things which Christ could not possibly ever agree with? Dare we refuse to take our rightful place in the life and work of the Church? Dare we refuse to think of eternity that awaits us beyond the grave? We really must reexamine every excuse we offer to the Lord! Really, just do it. And do not wait, do it now, as we prepare for the anniversary of the Nativity in the Flesh of our Lord.

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From Sheep to Souls

Saint Spyridon of Tremithus was born towards the end of the third century on the island of Cyprus. He was a shepherd, and had a wife and children. He used all his substance for the needs of his neighbors and the homeless, for which the Lord rewarded him with a gift of wonderworking. He healed those who were incurably sick, and cast out demons.

After the death of his wife, during the reign of Constantine the Great (306-337), he was made Bishop of Tremithus, Cyprus. As a bishop, the saint did not alter his manner of life, but cared for his flock with great love. Through his prayer, drought was replaced by abundant rains, and incessant rains were replaced by fair weather. Through his prayers the sick were healed and demons cast out. St Simeon Metaphrastes, the author of his life, likened St Spyridon to the Patriarch Abraham in his hospitality. All the lives of the saint speak of the amazing simplicity and the gift of wonderworking granted him by God. Through a word of the saint the dead were awakened, the elements of nature tamed, the idols smashed. According to the witness of Church historians, St Spyridon participated in the sessions of the First Ecumenical Council in the year 325.

St Spyridon lived his earthly life in righteousness and sanctity, and prayerfully surrendered his soul to the Lord. His relics repose on the island of Corfu (Kerkyra), in a church named after him.
